



A LARGE fishing industry may soon develop near the top view of Lake Tanganyika in the top picture, which is taken at Mpulungu, Northern Rhodesia's only port. It is on the extreme southern tip of the lake, 25 miles from Abercorn.

A fisheries research unit will soon be sent to the lake shore under the four-year development plan for the Northern and Luapula provinces to examine the possibilities of exploiting the vast fish resources of the lake, which at present are tapped only from the Belgian Congo shore to the north.

At left are the ruins of the old Niamkoso Church, which was built on the hill overlooking Mpulungu by the first Europeans who sailed down the lake to Northern Rhodesia in the 1880s.

They were members of the London Missionary Society, who beached their sailing ship, The Good News, on the shore beneath the hill, where they built the church in 1895.

Within 10 years, however, they were forced to move the mission some 10 miles inland because of the deadly sleeping sickness on the lake shore, and the Norman-st church fell into ruins.
